Dear Families of Our Lady of Lourdes,

Next week we will send home the mid-year reports and in the following week parent teacher interviews will be held. Children of all ages take their cues from their parents, so your reaction to their school report can affect the way they see themselves as learners and as people. It is vitally important to acknowledge their efforts and celebrate successes.

When you get your child's report you will naturally look at the Overall Achievement that will indicate the grade from A-E. Don't forget that the expected level of achievement is a C. This is the grade level achievement – a simple one liner is that in a report a "C is for Celebrate."

When you open the school report do you look for strengths or weaknesses first? The challenge is to focus on strengths rather than focus purely on areas that need improving. Take into account your child's effort and attitude to learning. If the report indicates that effort is below standard then you and your child have something to work on. If your child is putting in the required effort then you can't ask any more than that regardless of the grading.

Broaden your focus away from academic performance to form a picture of how your child is progressing as an individual in a social setting. The skills of independence and cooperation are highly rated by employers these days so don't dismiss these as unimportant.

Discuss the report with your child, and teacher at our upcoming parent teacher interviews, talking about their strengths first before looking at areas needing improvement. Ask for your child's opinion about how they performed and discuss their concerns. Set some short term learning goals. Reaching a short-term goal is a tremendous motivator for anyone!

After reports are read and discussed celebrate your children's efforts recognising their progress.


Maths Is Fun

Helping Your Child With Measurement

Children need to observe how measurement is used in practical situations. First, they need to talk about the things that we can measure and the things that we can use to measure them. Then they will need to learn about the units we use for measuring, such as litres, kilograms and metres.

What can you do at home?

- Give your child different sized plastic cups and a larger container to play with in the bath or shower. Encourage your child to guess how many of each cup it will take to fill the container.
- Talk about how many cups of each ingredient are used in a recipe when you are cooking together.
- Put sand in a large plastic tub so children can fill containers with sand. Sieves, colanders, plastic spoons, old clean margarine tubs, plastic bottles and funnels are useful for playing with sand.
- Have children weigh themselves. Weigh other family members and family pets.
- Use modelling dough to roll out two "snakes" of different length. Talk about one snake being "shorter" and the other "longer".
- Record your child's growth on a height chart.
- Talk about events in terms of time. For example, "It's going to take about three minutes to cook this, so you might have time to butter some bread."
- Mark special events on a calendar and talk about how many days until the event and which day of the week the event will be on.
- Watch the weather report together and talk about the forecasted temperatures for the following day. Ask your child what they might need to wear or have with them.

FEATURES OF YOUR CHILD'S MID YEAR SCHOOL REPORT

EFFORT GRADES

An effort grade is given for each Key Learning Area. Grades are: Commendable, Satisfactory or Improvement Required. Seven commendable grades earn an invitation to the Principal's Morning Tea.

STUDENT'S ACHIEVEMENT IN KEY LEARNING AREAS

Your child's achievement for the strands in each of the Key Learning Areas is reported using a five point scale for Year 1 –Year 6:

A Excellent Achievement	The student has an extensive knowledge and understanding of the content and can readily apply this knowledge. In addition, the student has achieved a very high level of competence in the processes and skills and can apply these skills to new situations.
B High Achievement	The student has a thorough knowledge and understanding of the content and has a high level of competence in the processes and skills. In addition, the student is able to apply this knowledge and these skills to most situations.
C Sound Achievement	The student has sound knowledge and understanding of the main areas of content and has achieved an adequate level of competence in the processes and skills.
D Basic Achievement	The student has basic knowledge and understanding of the content and has achieved a limited level of achievement.
E Elementary Achievement	The student has an elementary knowledge and understanding in few areas of the content and has achieved very limited competence in some of the processes and skills.

In some KLAs, strands are listed separately but not always reported on individually. This is the case in Religious Education, HSIE (History and Geography), and Science (Working Scientifically, Working Technologically, The Made Environment, The Natural Environment). Overall grades for English, Mathematics, PDHPE and Creative Arts are determined by teachers- different strands have different weightings.

SOCIAL SKILLS, WORK HABITS, FOLLOWING RULES AND CHRISTIAN ATTITUDE Items are grouped into our school rules of Respect, Responsibility and Readiness to Learn. These items reflect behaviours and attitudes from a Catholic perspective as well as the child's ability to follow expectations, work cooperatively and generally give their best effort.

ABSENCES

Absences are automatically generated on the date the report was printed. This day may vary slightly across the school depending on when the teacher prints the report.

COMMENTS

Our Semester 1 Reports do not have comments, as all parents are required to attend parent teacher interviews in the last week of school. At this interview grades can be more fully explained and parents have the opportunity to ask questions allowing for a much clearer picture of the child as learner than is the case with written comments.
